


MAMPU in South Sulawesi

Project Brief

MAMPU – The Australia-Indonesia Partnership for Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment – is a partnership between the Australian Government (DFAT) and Government of Indonesia (BAPPENAS). MAMPU supports the achievement of Indonesia's medium term development plans (RPJMN) and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by empowering women who are poor and improving their access to essential government services and programs. MAMPU reaches marginalised women by working with our network of civil society organisations – the MAMPU Partners – to develop women's collective capacity and empower them to influence decision making from the village to national level. MAMPU Partners work alongside allies in government, parliament and the private sector advocating for change in five thematic areas by developing promising models and approaches. This influence plays a key role in shaping government reform to the benefit of poor women.





IMPROVING WOMEN ACCESS TO SOCIAL PROTECTION PROGRAMS

KPI (Koalisi Perempuan Indonesia / Indonesian Women's Coalition) has developed a pilot program '**PIPA JKN**' to provide information, handle complaints and advocate for improved access by poor women to social protection, national health insurance, and other government services and programs. This initiative is run by members of their women's groups called **Balai Perempuan** formed under MAMPU to strengthen community organising and women's leadership. KPI also has a special focus on advocating for the rights of people with disabilities including implementation of the National Disability Law (No.7/2016) and access to social protection. MAMPU supports KPI's work in 12 villages in 4 districts in South Sulawesi.



One of the objectives of Balai Perempuan is to increase women's capacity in advocacy

KAPAL Perempuan (Alternative Women's Education Circle Institute), and its sub-partner **YKPM** run women's leadership and empowerment education and training through **Sekolah Perempuan**, an Informal Women's School initiative. This gives poor women the confidence and skills to participate in village development planning meetings to advocate for better access to social protection, national health insurance, and other programs. KAPAL also implements **Gender Watch**, forming monitoring teams to collect data and monitor women's access to national health insurance for the poor (JKN PBI). MAMPU supports KAPAL in 4 villages in Pangkajene Islands in South Sulawesi.

PEKKA supports **female heads of households** through women's groups formed under MAMPU, to advocate to local government to draft, implement and monitor regulations to improve women's access to government services, including legal identity documentation and social protection. This work is supported through their '**KLIK PEKKA**' initiative, a mobile consultation and information service in PEKKA villages. PEKKA also supports women's economic empowerment through their '**PEKKA Mart**' initiative. MAMPU supports PEKKA in 28 villages in 2 districts in South Sulawesi.



IMPROVING WOMEN'S ACCESS TO HEALTH AND NUTRITION SERVICES



'Aisyiyah is an Islamic women's mass organization which forms women's groups (BSA) under MAMPU to pilot their '**Service Model**' initiative which improves women's access to and quality of reproductive health and nutrition services at village health centers (*puskesmas*). 'Aisyiyah is also trialing '**Rumah Gizi**' to provide education on nutrition and exclusive breastfeeding. MAMPU supports 'Aisyiyah in 15 villages in 4 districts in South Sulawesi.

REDUCING VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Violence Against Women – working with parliamentarians and government

BaKTI works through their sub-partners YLP2EM Parepare and YKS to implement their ‘Participatory Recess’ initiative. This brings **Constituent Groups** formed under MAMPU, together with parliamentarians, government and the media to advocate for, draft, and monitor the implementation of regulations to improve women’s access to essential services, including for victims of violence. In Maros, BaKTI’s close cooperation with the Women’s Empowerment and Child Protection Office is leading to improved services that handle cases of violence (P2TP2A). BaKTI also works with government through their **Gender Responsive Planning & Budgeting Clinic** to review development planning and budgeting documents. MAMPU supports BaKTI in 30 villages in Maros and Tana Toraja districts and Parepare Cities and in South Sulawesi.



COLLECTIVE ACTION FOR WOMEN-CENTERED SDGs IN SOUTH SULAWESI

KAPAL Perempuan leads MAMPU’s five Partners in South Sulawesi in consultations with local government, CSOs, people with disabilities and disability groups on implementation of the SDGs through government action plans (RAD) that are gender responsive, inclusive and transformative. Issues raised include ending child marriage and violence against women, improving access to social protection, and promoting tolerance and diversity.



MAMPU Partners in South Sulawesi have involved **231,905 women** and **53,927 men** in their community based activities **from 2016 to 2019**.

The annual budget allocated by Maros to the **P2TP2A** has increased sharply following advocacy and assistance from BaKTI, **from zero in 2016, to 131 million rupiah in 2017**, and an additional 17 percent increase in **2018 budget to 153 million rupiah**.



At least 26 local policies benefitting women and children were influenced by MAMPU partners in South Sulawesi, including Parepare City’s Regulation on the Protection of Women and Children Victims of Violence, Bantaeng Regent’s Regulation on Poverty Alleviation and Social Protection, Bone’s Millari Village Regulation to end **child marriage** and so forth.
